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As a community member living near the Cedar Grove Maple Valley facility, I am deeply concerned about the potential health and quality-of-life impacts these proposed changes could have on our neighborhood. Allowing increased emissions of volatile organic compounds (VOCs), ammonia, and particulate matter—especially PM2.5, which is known to penetrate deeply into the lungs—poses a serious risk to the health of residents, particularly children, the elderly, and individuals with respiratory conditions.

Moreover, the proposal to open the second bay door without sufficient odor-neutralizing measures raises significant concerns about increased odors affecting the daily lives of nearby families. This could degrade air quality and property values in a community already burdened by proximity to industrial activity.

I urge the Puget Sound Clean Air Agency to reconsider approving these changes without more robust safeguards, such as stricter emission limits, mandatory odor mitigation measures, and enhanced third-party monitoring to ensure compliance. The health and well-being of local families should take precedence over operational convenience for the facility.

Dear Ms. McFerran,

I am writing to express my strong opposition to the proposed Order of Approval No. 11573 for the Cedar Grove Maple Valley facility. As a scientist with a PhD in Environmental Sciences & Engineering and a resident living approximately 2 miles north of the facility, I have both professional and personal concerns about this proposal.

I bring relevant expertise to this matter through my background in environmental consulting, environmental forensics, and current work in environmental policy. Additionally, as someone who actively supports responsible composting practices, I understand the importance of balancing operational needs with community impacts.

**Specific Concerns with the Proposed Changes**

1. Increased Emissions and Reduced Monitoring

Should Cedar Grove's permit application be approved, it would result in:

- An increase of 8.4 tons/year of VOCs
- An increase of 0.7 tons/year of ammonia
- Reduced frequency of third-party evaluations from quarterly to semiannually
- Elimination of continuous monitoring requirements for several biofilter parameters
- Opening of a second bay door during operations

These changes would significantly reduce oversight while simultaneously increasing emissions, creating an unacceptable risk to community health.

2. Inadequate Technical Justification for Control Measures

While the Agency notably determined that the proposed odor curtain does not constitute Best Available Control Technology (BACT), the technical basis for subsequent decisions appears insufficient. PSCAA has not provided quantitative analysis comparing the effectiveness of various control technologies (odor curtain vs. biofilter) and has, therefore, not demonstrated that the approved control measures will adequately address increased emissions and odor.

3. Impact on Sensitive Receptors

The proximity of Maple Hills Elementary School to the facility raises critical public health concerns. Scientific literature extensively documents children's heightened

vulnerability to air pollutants due to their developing respiratory systems, higher breathing rates relative to body size, and increased outdoor activity levels. Given this well-established scientific understanding, any proposal to increase emissions near a school requires exceptional scrutiny and justification. The current proposal appears to disregard these fundamental public health considerations for our most vulnerable population.

## **Community Impact and Personal Experience**

As I write this at 9:30 PM on Wednesday, January 29, 2025, the distinct odor of Cedar Grove composting has just invaded my living room after the seemingly innocent act of opening the door to let my dog out. This is part of a pattern that has defined my day - I first encountered the smell at 7:30am during my commute, then again while picking up my child from daycare in downtown Issaquah (over 5 miles from Cedar Grove's facility). And then, as expected, I smelled it with even more intensity upon arriving home at 5:30pm. January alone has brought at least five separate incidents of these pervasive odors to our community. The facility's persistent impact on daily life, coupled with the proposed relaxation of monitoring requirements, raises serious questions about regulatory oversight and community protection.

Since moving to our home in Issaquah in November 2020, my family has experienced firsthand the significant impact of Cedar Grove's current operations on our neighborhood:

- Frequent inability to open windows or engage in outdoor activities
- Persistent odors that affect quality of life
- Concerns about long-term health effects, particularly for my child
- Negative impacts on property values
- Lower inclination to engage in local recreation (e.g., hiking on Tiger and Squak Mountains, where I often smell Cedar Grove composting)

These existing issues demonstrate that the facility's current operations already exceed reasonable thresholds for community impact. **Any operational modifications should focus on reducing (not increasing) emissions, and strengthening (not weakening) monitoring requirements.**

## **Compliance History and Enforcement Concerns**

The proposal to reduce monitoring requirements while allowing increased emissions is particularly concerning given Cedar Grove's documented history of non-compliance. The facility has:

- Been the subject of thousands of odor complaints from community members
- Faced multiple lawsuits regarding their operational impacts
- Demonstrated a pattern of permit violations

This track record raises fundamental questions about the facility's ability to operate within permitted limits. It would be imprudent to grant additional operational flexibility and reduced

oversight to a facility that has consistently struggled to maintain compliance with existing requirements. The proposal to allow increased emissions and reduced monitoring appears to disregard this troubled compliance history and the legitimate concerns of the surrounding community.

## **Requested Actions**

1. Deny the proposed reductions in monitoring frequency and requirements. Instead, consider:
  - Maintaining or increasing the frequency of third-party evaluations
  - Expanding continuous monitoring requirements
  - Implementing more rigorous compliance verification methods
2. Reject operational changes that would increase emissions, including:
  - The proposed increase in VOC and ammonia emissions
  - Changes to bay door operations without adequate control measures
  - Any changes that would result in increase odor emittance
3. Require additional measures to reduce current impacts:
  - Implementation of more effective odor control technologies
  - Enhanced monitoring and reporting requirements
  - Development of a comprehensive community impact mitigation plan
  - Creation of a Community Data Dashboard where the public can monitor Cedar Grove air quality data in real time

It is PSCAA's responsibility to protect public health and ensure regulatory compliance. Given Cedar Grove's operational history, any modifications to their permit should move in the direction of increased oversight and more stringent emissions controls, not the opposite. I urge PSCAA to reject this proposal in its current form and instead require modifications that would reduce *current* community impacts. The Agency's mission to protect public health necessitates a more stringent approach to emissions control and monitoring at this facility.

Enclosed with this comment letter is a detailed set of questions regarding the proposed modifications. These questions underscore significant concerns about the proposal's direction – particularly why the Agency is considering permits that would increase emissions rather than focusing on reducing the facility's current impact on our community. I kindly request responses to these questions as part of the Agency's review process.

Current Cedar Grove Compost emissions require my family to shut off all interior fans, shut off the heat, and ensure all vents to the exterior are closed. Cedar Grove Compost still seeps into our home. I suffer from constant migraine headaches, constant nausea, itchy bloody nose, stiff neck, stiff jaw, rapid heart rate, etc. I've been sicker the last six years than any other time in my life and it's directly related to the toxic air I'm forced to breathe from Cedar Grove Compost. I no longer go outside my home. I no longer open my windows. I am a prisoner in my own home and even then, I cannot escape the toxic air.

Our only remedy is to sell our home, but now Cedar Grove Compost, in conjunction with PSCAA, will make that more difficult also. With an increase in emissions, our home will immediately lose value. Our decision to move to this area in 2018 was one of the worst decisions I've made in my life. It's been nothing but constant sickness, constant worry, and being trapped inside my home. We can't go for walks in our forested community. We can't enjoy the outside space we work hard to finance. Every aspect of our lives has been negatively impacted by Cedar Grove Compost emissions.

Our community needs Cedar Grove Compost to invest in infrastructure to mitigate emissions and reduce the toxicity they release into the air. They are a privately owned facility, profiting off our suffering and have absolutely NO motivation to invest in improvements unless forced by permit or law. They will NEVER do better unless forced to do so.

This letter is my Public Comment regarding Puget Sound Clean Air's proposed action to issue a Determination of Non-significance for the Cedar Grove Maple Valley facility. AKA - Cedar Grove Compost facility (one of the largest such facilities in the United States)!

For reference, please be aware of the following:

- First, there is nothing NON-SIGNIFICANT regarding Cedar Grove Compost's (CGC) operations that have not significantly impacted and directly affected the rights of surrounding property owners to enjoy and use their properties odor free from the stench-ings released by CGC's operations.
- WA State statute states that offensive odors are not to travel beyond a property owner's property line.
- Cedar Grove Compost started operating its facility in the late 1980's/early 1990's, several decades after the previous establishment of numerous major residential land uses north, east, west and south of its location off the Cedar Grove Road, Maple Valley, WA.
- While the King County land use designation is generally Rural Agriculture in the area, little to no agricultural activities take place in the surrounding area other than the building of rural residential horse farms and some very minor hobby cattle farms (serving the on-site resident).
- The majority of the land use surrounding Cedar Grove Compost is residential with the majority of properties being medium density - residential properties of 1/4 acres.
- Additionally, the Maple Hills Elementary School is located approximately one-half mile to the west of the CGC facility.
- Residential Communities surrounding Cedar Grove Compost area are:
- Maple Hills and East Renton Highlands

- May Valley Community
- Sunset Valley Farms and South Firs
- High Valley Estates
- Four Lakes
- Mazama Woods
- Lake Desire / Spring Lake Communities
- Mirrormont Community / Tiger Mountain
- Issaquah Creek Valley
- All the above-mentioned residential communities have been adversely affected and impacted by Cedar Grove Compost operations allowing offensive odors to travel beyond its property lines. Many of the above residential communities are 2+ miles (as the crow flies) away and more.

Since 1997, Cedar Grove Compost has continually allowed offensive odors to travel several miles beyond its property lines and impact the surrounding communities causing harm and preventing surrounding community residents from enjoying and using their hard-earned properties as intended by Washington State statute. Often offended communities are those located to the east of Cedar Grove Compost due to prevailing winds.

**Fact:** February/March 2001, Cedar Grove Compost agreed to settle a Class Action lawsuit of the surrounding community residents – *Anderson et al v. Cedar Grove Compost*. Fines were imposed and residents received financial compensation. Not adequate to offset the impact of CGC actions or lack thereof.

**Fact:** June 2018, Cedar Grove Compost agreed to settle the Class Action lawsuit *Avila v. Cedar Grove Composting* for denying residents their ability to enjoy and use their properties as intended. Monetary fines imposed and distributed to affected residents. Again, the fines were not adequate compensation to offset the impact of CGC actions or lack thereof.

**Fact:**

- Cedar Grove Composting has not been a good neighborhood or acted in good faith to follow the laws of Washington State and King County.
- Cedar Grove Composting continues to demonstrate that it is not capable of policing its own operations. There are numerous years of direct violations recorded by residents and reported / filed at Puget Sound Clean Air, dating back to 1996, as evidence in its archives.
- During the first two weeks of 2025, Cedar Grove Compost has allowed no less than four (4) odor violations to impact the Issaquah Creek Valley residents almost three miles east of its facility.

#### **Regarding PS Clean Air's PRELIMINARY DETERMINATION:**

- Removing continuous monitoring of biofilter operating will provide an open license for Cedar Grove Composting to break the Clean Air statutes of Washington State and to actively stench the surrounding communities with offensive odors.

What are the Corrective Actions mentioned for the biofilters?

Will there be immediate fines executed against CGC when offensive odors drift off Cedar Grove Composting properties?

What protections will Puget Sound Clean Air be putting in place to protect the surrounding communities and children attending Maple Hills Elementary School? In the past, students were denied outside recesses when Cedar Grove stenches took place. How is PS Clean Air going to protect the students?

**Proposed changes should not be approved!**

- Cedar Grove Composting, the applicant, is requesting the reduction of monitoring frequency of third-party evaluations from quarterly to quarterly to semiannually and increase reporting time from 30 days to 60 days.

Again, Cedar Grove Composting, for decades, has actively demonstrated that it cannot monitor and police its operations to prevent odors from traveling off its property. Thus, independent onsite monitoring is needed at both Cedar Grove Composting and throughout the surrounding communities.

Third party evaluations should not be reduced from every three months to every six months with sixty days for reporting submittal. Such a proposal pushes any potential corrective actions proposed by Puget Sound Clean Air for resolution out an additional five months. How is this protecting the surrounding community residents from on-going offensive odor stenches?

**Proposed changes should not be approved!**

- Request to modify Condition No. 13 of OA 10645 removing the requirement to keep the second bay door of the tipping building closed by proposing the installation of an odor neutralizing spray curtain. This modification should not be approved.

In years past, installed odor neutralizing spraying efforts have not been effective to reduce offensive odors from drifting outside Cedar Grove Composting's property lines. Tipping Building doors should remain closed.

**Condition No. 13 of OA 10645 should not be modified. Odor neutralizing spray should not be a substitute.**

- Puget Sound Clean Air should maintain smoke testing if, it is required or needed to prevent odors from leaving Cedar Grove Composting its property lines to impact and prevent surrounding residential communities from using and enjoying their properties per statute.
- Smoke testing reduction request from the current quarterly frequency to every six months should be denied.

A change in the smoke testing frequency evaluations should not be reduced from every three months to every six months with sixty days for reporting submittal. Such a proposal will push any potential Puget Sound Clean Air corrective actions/resolutions out an additional five months. How would this proposal protect the surrounding community residents from on-going offensive odor stenches? It would not.

- Review of grinder replacement in the existing grinder building.

If PS Clean Air determines that a new improved more efficient grinder is appropriate to improve the quality of finished composting product and reduce odors from leaving the Cedar Grove Composting property, approval of its replacement should proceed. In conclusion, Cedar Grove Composting and its owner, Steve Banchero and/or the Banchero Family, have for decades demonstrated the following:

- Current Operations create offensive odors which leave Cedar Grove Composting's property under the current Operating Agreement (OA).
- At least four violations of offensive odors have occurred in the first two weeks of 2025.
- Cedar Grove Composting cannot police its operations without violating Washington State Clean Air statutes. Decades of evidence exists at Puget Sound Clean Air dating back to 1997 or earlier.
- Cedar Grove Compost has not been a good neighbor to the surrounding communities.

In the past two decades, the surrounding communities have executed two class action lawsuits to persuade Cedar Grove Compost to operate in a somewhat decent manner to comply with Washington State Statute.

Currently, CGC is not operating per the existing Operating Agreement – four offenses in the first two weeks of 2025. How will CGC operate if the existing Operating Agreement is modified with reduced requirements? History is an indicator – surrounding community residents will suffer and not be able to enjoy the use of their properties!

In Bellevue, Cedar Grove Composts operations for finished product odors do not appear to flow off the property. Why have offensive odors continued to flow off Cedar Grove Composts Maple Valley and Everett operations?

It is Puget Sound Clean Air's responsibility to protect the citizens and its the resident's right to enjoy the use of property per statute.

Composting in general is good but composting should not impact and prevent surrounding community residents from enjoying their properties. Cedar Grove Compost must contain and keep its offensive odors within its property lines.

Modifications to the current Operating Agreement should not occur. Please "do the right thing" and act accordingly to protect the surrounding communities.

This letter is my Public Comment regarding Puget Sound Clean Air's proposed action to issue a Determination of Non-significance for the Cedar Grove Maple Valley facility. AKA - Cedar Grove Compost facility (one of the largest such facilities in the United States)!

For reference, please be aware of the following:

- First, there is nothing NON-SIGNIFICANT regarding Cedar Grove Compost's (CGC) operations that have not significantly impacted and directly affected the rights of surrounding property owners to enjoy and use their properties odor free from the stenches released by CGC's operations.
- WA State statute states that offensive odors are not to travel beyond a property owner's property line.
- Cedar Grove Compost started operating its facility in the late 1980's/early 1990's, several decades after the previous establishment of numerous major residential land uses north, east, west and south of its location off the Cedar Grove Road, Maple Valley, WA.
- While the King County land use designation is generally Rural Agriculture in the area, little to no agricultural activities take place in the surrounding area other than the building of rural residential horse farms and some very minor hobby cattle farms (serving the on-site resident).
- The majority of the land use surrounding Cedar Grove Compost is residential with the majority of properties being medium density - residential properties of ¼ acres.
- Additionally, the Maple Hills Elementary School is located approximately one-half mile to the west of the CGC facility.
- Residential Communities surrounding Cedar Grove Compost area are:
  - o Maple Hills and East Renton Highlands
  - o May Valley Community
  - o Sunset Valley Farms and South Firs

- High Valley Estates
- Four Lakes
- Mazama Woods
- Lake Desire / Spring Lake Communities
- Mirrormont Community / Tiger Mountain
- Issaquah Creek Valley

- All the above-mentioned residential communities have been adversely affected and impacted by Cedar Grove Compost operations allowing offensive odors to travel beyond its property lines. Many of the above residential communities are 2+ miles (as the crow flies) away and more.

Since 1997, Cedar Grove Compost has continually allowed offensive odors to travel several miles beyond its property lines and impact the surrounding communities causing harm and preventing surrounding community residents from enjoying and using their hard-earned properties as intended by Washington State statute. Often offended communities are those located to the east of Cedar Grove Compost due to prevailing winds.

**Fact:** February/March 2001, Cedar Grove Compost agreed to settle a Class Action lawsuit of the surrounding community residents – *Anderson et al v. Cedar Grove Compost*. Fines were imposed and residents received financial compensation. Not adequate to offset the impact of CGC actions or lack thereof.

**Fact:** June 2018, Cedar Grove Compost agreed to settle the Class Action lawsuit *Avila v. Cedar Grove Composting* for denying residents their ability to enjoy and use their properties as intended. Monetary fines imposed and distributed to affected residents. Again, the fines were not adequate compensation to offset the impact of CGC actions or lack thereof.

**Fact:**

- Cedar Grove Composting has not been a good neighborhood or acted in good faith to follow the laws of Washington State and King County.
- Cedar Grove Composting continues to demonstrate that it is not capable of policing its own operations. There are numerous years of direct violations recorded by residents and reported / filed at Puget Sound Clean Air, dating back to 1996, as evidence in its archives.
- During the first two weeks of 2025, Cedar Grove Compost has allowed no less than four (4) odor violations to impact the Issaquah Creek Valley residents almost three miles east of its facility.

**Regarding PS Clean Air's PRELIMINARY DETERMINATION:**

- 1) Removing continuous monitoring of biofilter operating will provide an open license for Cedar Grove Composting to break the Clean Air statutes of Washington State and to actively stench the surrounding communities with offensive odors.

What are the Corrective Actions mentioned for the biofilters?

Will there be immediate fines executed against CGC when offensive odors drift off Cedar Grove Composting properties?

What protections will Puget Sound Clean Air be putting in place to protect the surrounding communities and children attending Maple Hills Elementary School? In the past, students were denied outside recesses when Cedar Grove stench-ings took place. How is PS Clean Air going to protect the students?

**Proposed changes should not be approved!**

- 2) Cedar Grove Composting, the applicant, is requesting the reduction of monitoring frequency of third-party evaluations from quarterly to quarterly to semiannually and increase reporting time from 30 days to 60 days.

Again, Cedar Grove Composting, for decades, has actively demonstrated that it cannot monitor and police its operations to prevent odors from traveling off its property. Thus, independent onsite monitoring is needed at both Cedar Grove Composting and throughout the surrounding communities.

Third party evaluations should not be reduced from every three months to every six months with sixty days for reporting submittal. Such a proposal pushes any potential corrective actions proposed by Puget Sound Clean Air for resolution out an additional five months. How is this protecting the surrounding community residents from on-going offensive odor stenches?

**Proposed changes should not be approved!**

- 3) Request to modify Condition No. 13 of OA 10645 removing the requirement to keep the second bay door of the tipping building closed by proposing the installation of an odor neutralizing spray curtain. This modification should not be approved.

In years past, installed odor neutralizing spraying efforts have not been effective to reduce offensive odors from drifting outside Cedar Grove Composting's property lines. Tipping Building doors should remain closed.

**Condition No. 13 of OA 10645 should not be modified. Odor neutralizing spray should not be a substitute.**

- 4) Puget Sound Clean Air should maintain smoke testing if, it is required or needed to prevent odors from leaving Cedar Grove Composting its property lines to impact and prevent surrounding residential communities from using and enjoying their properties per statute.
- 5) Smoke testing reduction request from the current quarterly frequency to every six months should be denied.

A change in the smoke testing frequency evaluations should not be reduced from every three months to every six months with sixty days for reporting submittal. Such a proposal will push

any potential Puget Sound Clean Air corrective actions/resolutions out an additional five months. How would this proposal protect the surrounding community residents from on-going offensive odor stenches? It would not.

**6) Review of grinder replacement in the existing grinder building.**

If PS Clean Air determines that a new improved more efficient grinder is appropriate to improve the quality of finished composting product and reduce odors from leaving the Cedar Grove Composting property, approval of its replacement should proceed.

We reside approximately 2 miles north of the facility and have concerns regarding this proposal. We are both in the health care industry and have very significant concerns regarding the health safety of our community.

Our specific concerns with the proposed changes include the following.

1. Increased Emissions and Reduced Monitoring
2. Inadequate Technical Justification for Control MeasuresThe Agency has not provided quantitative analysis comparing the has, therefore, not demonstrated that the approved control measures will adequately address increased emissions and odor.
3. Community and health Impact of exposure to increased emissions.

The proximity of Maple Hills Elementary School to the facility raises particular concerns regarding children's exposure to increased emissions. Other significant neighborhood impacts we are concerned about and have personally experienced from Cedar Grove's current operations include, frequent inability to open windows or engage in outdoor activities due to persistent and unpleasant odors, concerns about health exposure to ourselves, family, neighbors, wildlife and pets, and negative impact on property values.

We request the following actions:

1. Deny the proposed reductions in monitoring frequency and requirements.
2. Reject operational changes that would increase emissions, including the proposed increase in VOC and ammonia emissions
3. Require additional measures to reduce current impacts, including implementing more effective odor control technologies, enhancing monitoring and reporting requirements.

I realize that I am past the 1/31/25 public response deadline for the proposed order No. 11573, but feel compelled to respond even if my voice cannot be included in the tally of responses to this proposed order. My partner and I experience ongoing exposure to sickening, and at times, throat-burning odors that envelop our neighborhood of Maple Hills, Renton. These odors prevent us from going outside and enjoying our home in fear of the chemicals contained in the foul odors. At times the odors are so strong they are detectable from the interior of our home. In 2017, my partner at the age of 39 and in peak health was diagnosed with stage-4 Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma - Diffuse large B-cell lymphoma and follicular lymphoma. Needless to say, we are deeply concerned that his exposure from living in close proximity to both the Cedar Grove Compost and Cedar Hills Landfill facilities since 2005 was the causative factor in his development of cancer.



If this proposal goes through the residents in these communities will suffer.

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1. The emission increase associated with the change in method of operation of tipping building is of great concern for this already environmentally marginalized community. The PSCAA should assess all environmental impacts in the region (Cedar Hills Landfill, Queen City Farms, Cedar Grove Compost) to fully understand that to allow any operational changes that would add more toxins, and odor potential into this immediate region's air would be to further disparage an environmentally marginalized community that has already been subjected to years of off-site toxins and stench. There is an elementary school in close proximity and has a history of noxious odors being experienced directly from Cedar Grove Compost. As a Clean Air Agency an approval of this request is diametrically opposed to Air Quality Basics. Clean ,healthy air is essential to our day-to-day well-being, our long-term health, and the health of our environment. The Clean Air Agency is to focus its efforts on reducing air pollutants not increasing them.
2. Due to the history of decades of permit violations, non-compliance issues, repeated lawsuits from the surrounding communities, it is reasonable to maintain strict oversight and continuous monitoring of biofilters operating parameters. This industrial polluter must have the strictest oversight to insure the public day-to-day well-being and long-term health, and the health of our environment. There is no justification for losing any operational conditions.
3. To decrease 3<sup>rd</sup> party evaluations from quarterly to semi-annual and increase report submittal time from 30 days after completion of the evaluation to 60 days should not be allowed. This industrial polluter again has a history of being in violation of its operating permit with off-site odors. The current evaluation and reporting times identifies any operational issues more quickly and corrective action would take place in a much timelier manner.
4. Opening the bay door of the tipping building should not be allowed. Using odor neutralizing spray curtain does not have the same effect as a closed door. Neutralizing spray has proved only marginally effective in mitigating odors when used.
5. No modified smoke test. This community deserves best practices in all areas of operation. Unless the new test modification is greater than the current method it should not be allowed.

To lower any requirements on this industrial polluter in order to accommodate the industry is not the mission of the PSCAA. **According to the proposal, PSCAA estimates potential emission increase associated with the change in method of operation of the tipping building is 8.4 tons/year volatile organic compounds (VOC) and 0.7 tons/year ammonia.**

PSCAA has made a **determination that the proposal would not have a probable significant adverse impact on the environment**. The communities are already adversely affected by the emissions from this facility. and you want to make it worse? By significant, do you mean it won't impact the environment say 300 days per year, only 250? Your "determination methodology" is questionable.

Why would the agency allow additional emissions when they already violate their current emissions standards and regulations? The odors from the compost are present multiple times per year and you want to increase that? Emission control has improved over the last few years, but they are still present. Just last week the odor was so bad that it permeated into my house, which it rarely does. I did file a complaint but it was around 9 at night, so I knew no investigation would be forthcoming.

As I understand it, PSCAA does not have enough agents to properly assess the odors every time complaints are filed. Rather they contact Cedar Grove and have them "self regulate and report". It is unacceptable to have businesses self regulated especially when their violations affect the public.

Thank you for taking the time to read these community responses and consider residents' experiences as you assess the compost facility's request to change how they are regulated.

My wife, two children, and I live about 2 miles away from the composting facility on the south side of Squak Mountain. Even under the current regulatory limitations, there are days when the odor from the composting facility is so strong that my kids will not go outside. My wife and I are hesitant to invite people to our home when the weather is nice outside because it may smell so bad as to send guests fleeing for their cars.

Beyond the disheartening, disgusting odor, we worry about the impact these pollutants represent to our family's health. Our kids attend local schools (Maple Hills Elementary, Maywood, Liberty) and have talked about how affecting the smell can be while they're at school. During summer swim team at Maple Hills Elementary they have talked about "hiding" under the water to get away from the composting smell. Quite the sad memory when you think about the beautiful place in which we live and how clean the air should be!

I am thankful we have a composting facility for the city as a service, but corporations that operate facilities like these must be closely monitored. It is extremely important to me and my family that the proposed changes not be enacted and that, if anything, further/additional efforts be made to limit the impact the facility has on children and families in the surrounding area.

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Cedar Grove Composting is requesting action via permit 11573 that will increase emissions, and I am strongly opposed to this permit. Cedar Grove Composting should be required to reduce emissions, not increase them.

As you are probably aware, the stench from Cedar Grove is an ongoing problem. They lost a lawsuit in 2016, and there was a minor and temporary reduction in the stench. But recently the stench has become more frequent and stronger.

The stench occurs frequently, at least three to four times per week. I never open windows in my home. If the stench occurs, the house fills with the stench and is temporarily unlivable.

If I could bottle the stench and open the bottle at your meeting, you would likely adjourn the meeting until the stench cleared. And rightly so. An odor is comprised of organic compounds, and you would be inhaling these particles into your lungs.

We are very concerned with Cedar Grove's request to change their method of operation which will result in an increase in air pollution as well as decreasing air pollution monitoring. In the past we were heavily affected by particulates that came with a very foul odor. We experienced head aches, dizziness and nausea on numerous days indoors if we had our windows open or if we spent time outside. Because of this we had to come inside and close our windows if the smell was in the air. Our neighbors have had similar negative experiences as well. Now that we are spending more time at home, air pollution from Cedar Grove Composting creates an even bigger health issue for us!

As stated in your public notice Posted on: December 18, 2024 “the estimated potential emission increase associated with the change in method of operation of the tipping building is 8.4 tons/year volatile organic compounds (VOC) and 0.7 tons/year ammonia.” This is extremely concerning! As our clean air agency we expect you to protect us from this pollution by rejecting the request.

Washington state statute states that offensive odors are not to travel beyond a property owner's property line. We live about two miles away from Cedar Grove Composting as the crow flies and there are hundreds of other homes in the area that

have experienced the smell as well. Cedar Grove Composting air pollution negatively affects our health, well-being, and property value.

While we are personally big proponents of compost, Cedar Grove Composting has demonstrated they need regulations and monitoring. The monitoring and operations that are currently in effect are working better than in the past (although I did smell Cedar Grove Composting today when I went outside around noon) and need to remain in effect. If any changes are made it should be to further improve air quality!

I live a little over a mile north of the Cedar Grove Maple Valley facility. I am hit with nauseating waves of stench just walking out of my front door probably 2-3 times per week, on average. I often report them via the Odor Nuisance form, though it seems unlikely that we'll ever get lucky enough for the smell to occur and for anyone to also be patrolling nearby at the same time. I will keep trying.

Regardless, I must express my deep opposition to this proposal. The frequency and level of smell has gotten significantly worse since I moved into my home 5 years ago. It is a foregone conclusion that reducing the amount of oversight will only make the situation worse.

Specifically, 1-5 are clearly designed to allow them to skirt their legal responsibilities generally and their moral responsibilities broadly to everyone who has to breath the air that they contaminate. 6 looks like they broke the rules, got caught, and are now asking for forgiveness rather than permission - what precedent would it set to condone that behavior?

Over the past two weeks alone, I have smelled some truly gut-churning odors driving south along Cedar Grove Rd, including this very evening. I have never experienced that before in the 5 years I have lived here (as I said, it's getting worse), and now I've experienced it 5 times in 2 weeks at all times of day. Under this proposal, I guarantee it will happen more and more frequently, polluting people's homes and properties for miles around.

I am already exposed to their pollutants and odors walking my dogs or working in the garden on a regular basis. I am also on the board for the Four Lakes neighborhood; my neighbors (80+ families, including elderly people and my own infant daughter) are frequently blanketed in disgusting, throat-scratching gases like I am.

There is no world where a company that is operating effectively and honestly both reduces how often they are checked for compliance AND asks for a ludicrous 60 day window to take corrective action. I negotiate multi-million dollar agreements as part of my work; I would never approve, let alone partner with, a company that requested 60 days to take corrective action.

As best I can tell, the final part of proposal is them retroactively asking for permission to do something they were required to ask for permission to do in the first place. It would be grossly and willfully ignorant of their behavior to see this and determine that they can be trusted with LESS oversight.

To conclude, anything that increases their potential emissions, reduces oversight, and makes enforcement and corrective measures more likely to

be skirted (I guarantee they will pick maximally beneficial times of year for themselves for any inspections) will make every person within miles of this facility less healthy and less able to enjoy their property - and to what end? Increased profit margins for a company that couldn't care less that its stench reaches over mountains and deep into Renton?

Approving this proposal would be a travesty of public service and detrimental to health and happiness of the local (and not so local) community. I oppose this proposal.

Thank you for your time and careful consideration of our public comment on Puget Sound Clean Air's proposed action to issue a Determination of Non-significance for the Cedar Grove Maple Valley facility. I would like to highlight my concern of the proposed order & would argue any increase in emissions is indeed significant to local residents.

*The estimated potential emission increase associated with the change in method of operation of the tipping building is 8.4 tons/year volatile organic compounds (VOC) and 0.7 tons/year ammonia. The estimated potential emission increase associated with the replacement grinder is 61 lb/year particulate matter with aerodynamic diameter less than 10 micron (PM<sub>10</sub>), with an estimated subset of 9 lb/yr of that PM<sub>10</sub> comprised of particulate matter with aerodynamic diameter less than 2.5 micron (PM<sub>2.5</sub>).*

The above statement is extremely concerning to local residents, especially those living in or using the Maple Hills Community. Both my daughters attended Maple Hills elementary school. We also use the Maple Hills community for Summer swim team. Over the years of using the Maple Hills Community for various reasons, school or pleasure the emissions from Cedar Grove has been offensive & detrimental to health. My daughter joked to me that sometimes, during swim training the kids stay under the water to avoid the smell!

I live 5.2 miles from Cedar Grove landfill by car, but far closer as the crow flies. Dependent on the wind direction we can often smell a very unpleasant smell from the landfill. I understand Washington State law determines a property owners offensive smell is not to travel beyond the property owners lines. If we can smell the landfill from our address, clearly these legal guidelines are not being met. Approving this order will only make matters worse, when in fact there is already a clear need to improve the emissions of Cedar Grove.

I am very pro composting & recycling, but Cedar Grove is already proving they need strong management to ensure it is continually strive to improve emissions. Please block this order, please do not allow Cedar Grove to make our health, quality of living & property values worse.
